Broadcaster, journalist and biographer Anita Anand was born in 1972 and educated at King's College, London. Her broadcasting career began in the newsroom of satellite channel Zee and she won the Natia Hassain Award in the category "Upcoming Television Broadcaster" in 2005. She has since presented several news and current affairs programmes for BBC radio and television, notably on Radio S Live and currently Radio 4's "Yoy Answers". On BBC2 she has co-hosted "The Dally Politics' show and presented "Newsnight".

Her first book, Sophia: Princess, Suffragette, Revolutionary, a biography of a campaigner for women's suffrage and indian independence, was published in 2015.

# About the book Sophia: Princess, Suffragette, Revolutionary

In 1876 Sophia Duleep Singh was born into Indian royalty. Her father, Maharajah Duleep Singh, was helr to the Kingdom of the Sibhs, one of the greatest empires of the Indian subcontinent, a realm that stretched from the lush Kashmir Valley to the craggy foothills of the Khyber Pass and Included the mighty cities of Lahore and Peshawar. It was a territory irresistible to the British, who plundered everything, including the fabled Koh-I-Noor diamons.

Exiled to England, the dispossessed Maharajah transformed his estate at Eveden in Suffolk into a Moghul palace, its grounds stocked with leopards, monkeys and exotic birds. Sophia, god-daughter of Queen Victoria, was raised a genteel aristocratic Englishwoman: presented at court, afforded grace and favor lodgings at Hampton Court Palace and photographed wearing the latest fashions for the society pages. But when, in secret deflance of the British government, she travelled to India, she returned a revolutionary.

Sophila transcended her heritage to devote herself to battling injustice and inequality, a far cry from the life to which she was born. Her causes were the struggle for Indian Independence, the fate of the lascars, the welfare of Indian soldiers in the First World War – and, above all, the fight for female suffrage. She was bold and fearless, attacking politicians, putting herself in the front line and swapping her siks for a nurse's uniform to tend wounded soldiers evacuated from the battlefields. Meticulously researched and passionately written, this enthralling story of the rise of women and the fall of empire introduces an extraordinary individual and her part in the defining moments of recent British and Indian history.

The achievement of the book is to tell the story of a life exceptional in its oroumstances, within the larger context of the historical relationship between Britain and India. In a polynant epilogue, Anand details how she eventually tracked down the only living people who had known Sophia: her goddaughter Drovna and the surviving evacues child. They were able to give testimony on what really mattered to Sophia, the advancement of women by democratic means; she told Drovna You are never, ever not to vote'. (This is a command that, in her acknowledgements, Anand herself repeats to her own neices and goddaughters). No matter that Sophia 'never managed to be sent to prison, and therefore was denied her chance to go on hunger strike and her place in the pantheon' of the suffragette movement – until now. A lifestory that encapsulates the rise of women and the fall of empires is one still full of relevance today. Anita Anand herself, as political journalist and biographer, observes these origing
